Had I known, Mama, I would have kissed your cheek with the biggest pucker I could muster.

Had I known it would be the last time, I would have put us in the same frame of the video I recorded of you. I would have bought another big caveman meal like only you could eat.

Had I known it would be the last time, I would've said "I Love You" more than once at the end of our conversation. I would have sat closer to your wheelchair. I would've sat playfully in your lap for you to push us around.

Had I known it would be the last time, I would have looked you in your eyes, Mama, and told you that you made ME proud of how you outlasted life support on every occasion, outsmarted multiple diagnoses, and outwitted even the most astute of medical practitioners.

You always amazed me with how you still witnessed the healing power of our Lord while in the very throes of sickness, going up and down the hallways of rehab centers and teaching bible study to staff and residents.

You astounded all who met you on paper before they met you in person.

You defied every law of death that I know and this time was no different because right when death thought it had you, you stuck out your tongue and said "aaa haaa, I'm not afraid to die anymore" and peacefully took your sleep.

The most important thing I would have reiterated is that you did not fail me. I get my unbreakable, resilient strength from you, the ability to see people very clearly for who they are, my laughter, my love for pearls, my

speaking voice, and my eye for class and elegance just to name a few things.

I learned many vital things from you: the value of a Mother, that it's never too late in life to reconcile, that faith trumps fear and that God's Grace reaches far past the speculation and opinions of others.

You fought this good fight of faith (as well as fighting a few people along the way...lol) and you won! You finished strong! You left final memories of laughter, love and family.

Rest in Power, Mama.


